Trial property update 2015 & 2016 trials: Tuloona Pastoral Company, Harrow







There is a concern at Tuloona, two good seasons in a row, something has to go wrong soon.

But let's not be Hanrahan.

The 2015 drop MLP progeny lambed for the first time in mid-September on over 3200 kg/DM. At lamb marking, 504 lambs were marked from 530 maiden ewes joined.

The lambs averaged approximately 12.5kg at two weeks of age, while their mothers averaged 61kg at lamb marking.

The F2 progeny will be weaned at 12 weeks of age in mid December.

The 2016 drop have had their individual worm egg counts done on all 820 progeny. A nice problem to have — finding dirty country to increase WECs was a bit of a challenge.

Trial update: 2015 MLP trial Teeth eruption scoring of 2015 drop







As part of an investigation into potential new Visual Sheep Scores, the 2015 Tuloona MLP drop ewes were scored for teeth eruption over a number of occasions using the following scoring system:

Score 1: Only lambs teeth showing.

Score 2: Lambs teeth missing or one of either of the permanent teeth starting to be seen.

Score 3: Both permanent teeth showing slightly.


Score 4: Both permanent teeth half up.

Score 5: Both permanent teeth fully up.

Considerable variation was observed between the 25 sires groups included in the trial (see graph below)



Furthermore, when compared to hogget weight at the time of scoring, very little difference was observed between those sheep that had <u>not</u> cut teeth (Score 1) and those that had cut teeth (Score 2, 3, 4 and 5).



Work will continue in this area and is expected that teeth scoring may become a normal part of sire evaluation trials in the future.

Trial update: 2016 MLP trial









2016 MLP ewes had body measurements taken at Tuloona on September 25. Ewes were condition scored, weighed, had fat and EMD scanning and teeth and dag scores taken. They also received a treatment of click, Eryvac and 6-in-1.





2017 Balmoral Sire Evaluation trial Property update: Kooringal, Coleraine



Since our last newsletter the excellent season has kept rolling along at "Kooringal" with all the dams full, above average lambing and a huge spring to finish it all off. The first two days of lambing of the 2017 trial lambs in mid-September was very wet and cold, which even included a flurry of snow! But the weather soon turned for the better and a reasonable lambing result was achieved with 780 lambs marked from 777 pregnant ewes.

Single bearing ewes lambed down onto approximately 1800 kilograms of dry matter (kg/dm) and the twins would have had 2000kg/dm or better.

Lambmarking was done in mid-October where we recorded birth coat, sex, body wrinkle, breech bare area and pigmentation. Thank you to all those that came to help on the day.

After the lambs were tagged we have set up Pedigree Matchmaker scanners in the paddocks to record their ewes against them to get the parentage of the lambs.

We are hoping to get as many recordings as possible and do a DNA paternity test on those not matched up on the Pedigree Matchmaker. The lambs are now being imprinted with a grain trail at least four times before weaning in December.



Merino Lifetime Productivity Project National Update Project manager: Anne Ramsay







QUICK FACTS: The focus of the Merino Lifetime Productivity (MLP) project is to gather a lifetime dataset on the F1 daughters of 135 unique and genetically diverse Merino sires across a range of environments.

Each year these F1 ewes will be wool sampled, visually scored, fleece weighed, live weighed, carcase scanned, faecal sampled, classed by two independent classers and finally, once mature, will be joined to Merino sires and repeat measured until they are over five years old.

This data plus genomic testing will be used to better understand how our current selection systems relate to lifetime production, and to fill data gaps so that we can learn more about the lifetime relationships between wool, carcase, disease resistance and fertility.

The MLP project is entering into a new era as the first of the next generation Balmoral (F2) progeny are tagged and further natural joinings are planned.

While at other sites the assessment and generation of the F1 ewes that will be tracked for life remains the focus.

Next year (2018) will see the tenth and final Al program in the project where 15 sires will be selected for the New England's ultra-fine site located just outside of Armidale.

Ram breeders interesting in having their sire's genetics evaluated through life are encouraged to nominate during December and January. For more information, head to www.wool.com/MLP.
